As we get closer to saying goodbye to Anne Heath, I wanted to reflect on Anne as an individual, on her time in Coburg, and finally to thank her for her years of service to our community.

Anne was born and raised in the Willamette Valley but moved with her family to Central Oregon for several years. When opportunities arose to return to the valley, she returned to the area she calls home.

Anne has been a good steward of city finances and has tirelessly advocated for Coburg on a regional and statewide basis. We will miss her, but as we say “Adeus”, Anne is ready to say “Olá” to Portugal as the first stop on her next adventure.

Anne, Coburg owes you a debt of gratitude for your vision and dedication, and we wish you well in the next phase of your life!

Adam is a lifelong Oregonian. Born in Eugene, he then moved to Pendleton in Eastern Oregon from age 5 to 18 before moving to Ashland to attend Southern Oregon University (technically attending Southern Oregon State College, a little age giveaway there). While a freshman at SOU, he worked part-time for the City of Ashland in the Utility Billing Department and pretty much never left until leaving the City in 2021, after having served in many different roles within the City and finishing as the City Manager.

While in Ashland, he completed his degree, met and married Cindy (a native Ashlander) became a

father of twin boys and balanced work, spousing, parenting, youth sports coaching, fly fishing, camping, and a healthy obsession with Duck sports.

This gives the Police Department time to interact with the students before they head off on their summer vacation! A fun time was had by all! Thank you Coburg Police!



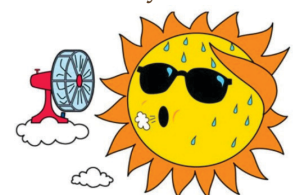
Emergency Preparedness and Response: Extreme Heat

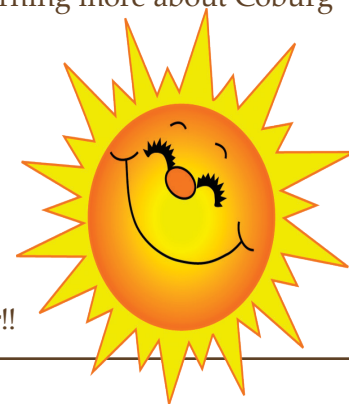



Public Right-of-Ways and Alleys in Coburg

Citizens are reminded that right-of-ways (ROW) and alleys are public properties, and therefore, should be respected and kept clear of yard debris, structures, personal property, etc.

Public right-of-ways abut every property that has a street bordering it. The right-of-way runs between the street and the property line. It is the property owners' responsibility to keep the right-of-way clear, mowed, and avoid storing of junk, vehicles, and or any other personal items.

Alleys are also public property and should not be utilized for dumping, storing of personal property, junk, or vehicles. Additionally, structures within

the alley are prohibited. While Coburg has a history of structures in alleys that goes back decades, new structures will not be allowed moving forward. If a structure is constructed in the alley, the owner will be asked to remove it immediately at their own expense.

Please help us maintain a safe and healthy community by maintaining the right-of-way in front of your home, and avoid dumping, storing, or parking vehicles in the alley.

If an alley or right-of-way in your neighborhood is not being maintained properly, please call it to our attention by notifying City Hall at 541-682-7850.

Downed Power Lines

Electrical hazards multiply for workers involved in clean up and recovery efforts following major disasters and weather emergencies. Life-threatening danger exists around downed and low-hanging electrical wires which can still be energized following a storm or high winds.

Always consider all electrical equipment, lines, and conductors to be energized. Even if lines are not sparking or humming, fallen electric lines can electrocute you if you touch them or the ground nearby.

Rules to Live By

- Do **not** assume that a downed power line is safe simply because its on the ground or it is not sparking.
- Do **not** assume that any wire is a harmless telephone, television, or fiber-optic cable, and does not carry lethal current.
- Treat everything electrical as energized until tested and proven to be de-energized.
- Never go near a downed or fallen electric power line.
- Electricity can spread outward through the ground in a circular shape from the point of contact. As you move away from the center, large differences in voltages can be created.
- **Never drive over downed power lines. Assume they are energized.**
- If contact is made with an energized power line while you are in a vehicle, remain calm and do not get out unless the vehicle is on fire. If possible, call for help.
- If you must exit any equipment because of fire or other safety reasons, try to jump completely clear, making sure that you do not touch the equipment and the ground at the same time. Land with both feet together and shuffle away in small steps to minimize the path of electric current and avoid electrical shock. Be careful to maintain your balance.

If you are the first on the scene of a down wire, call 911 immediately.

dropped power lines onto our roads, started fires, and blacked out traffic signals. It made each of us go back to basic traffic and safety lessons such as: never touch or drive over a downed line; treat every intersection as a 4-way stop, and act with courtesy to other drivers, emergency workers, and pedestrians. Our fire, police, and public works staff worked as fast and hard as they could to keep everyone safe and to help restore order to Coburg. A big thank you to all of them!

You may wonder what a Mayor in Coburg does. I find I am spending a lot of time on transportation issues that impact our community and advocating for Coburg on a regional basis. So much of our traffic comes from outside of our city so we have little to no control over the number of commuters and commercial traffic. Coburg staff, Councilors, and appointed officials have been interacting with County and State officials to make sure Coburg's voice is heard. We are trying to keep Coburg in the discussion as Federal and State infrastructure

funding becomes available. The most prominent projects for Coburg are developing a freight corridor to alleviate traffic on Willamette Street, upgrading crosswalks, expanding safe routes to school, and the improvement of the I-5 Coburg interchange. Some of these projects have been in the planning stages for years, but even if funds were available today, it might be several years before the changes would be completed. These issues, along with water projects and daily city management, keep everyone busy.

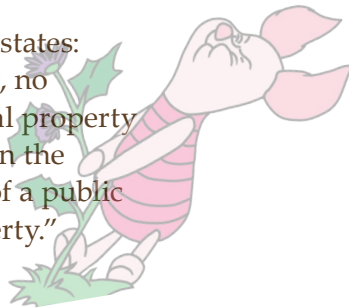

Noxious Vegetation Enforcement June 1 - October 30

REMINDER! City's Ordinance states: "Between June 1 and October 30, no owner or person in charge of real property shall allow noxious vegetation on the property or in the right of way of a public thoroughfare abutting the property."



Noxious Vegetation includes:

- Weeds and grass more than 10 inches high.
- Vegetation that is, or is likely to become, a health hazard, a fire hazard, or a traffic hazard because it impairs the view of the public thoroughfare, or otherwise makes use of the thoroughfare hazardous.
- Poison Oak, blackberry bushes, bamboo, or ivy that extends into a public right-of-way.

REMINDER!

Rate increases will be reflected on the Utility bills that go out in August.

Utility bills include water, sewer, transportation utility fee, tree fee. The base monthly bill for a single family residential customer using 700 cubic feet (5,236 gallons) per month will now be \$156.79 an increase of \$8.09 per month.
